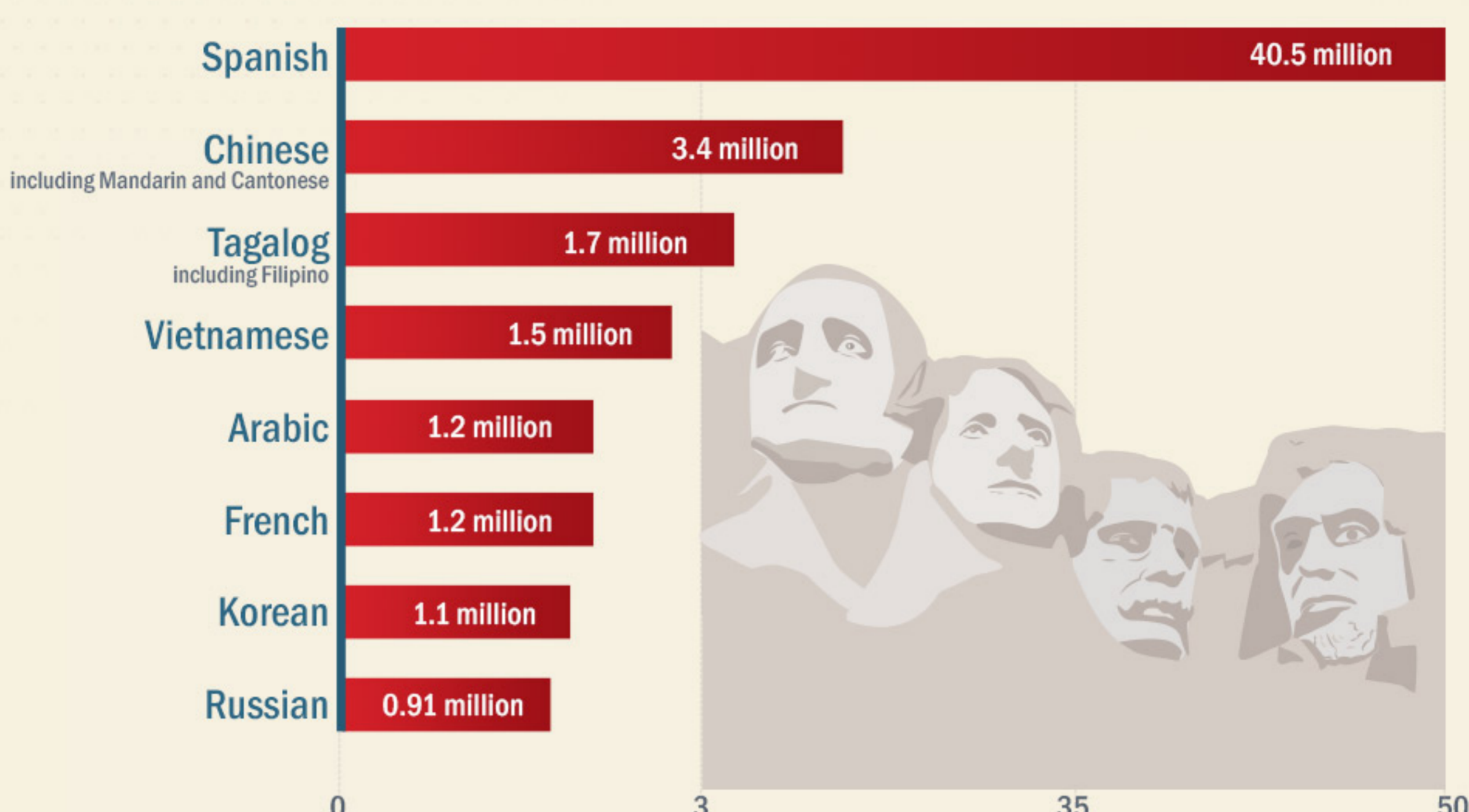


ONE NATION MANY LANGUAGES

While English remains the dominant language of the United States, significant portions of the population speak another language within their communities, and at home.

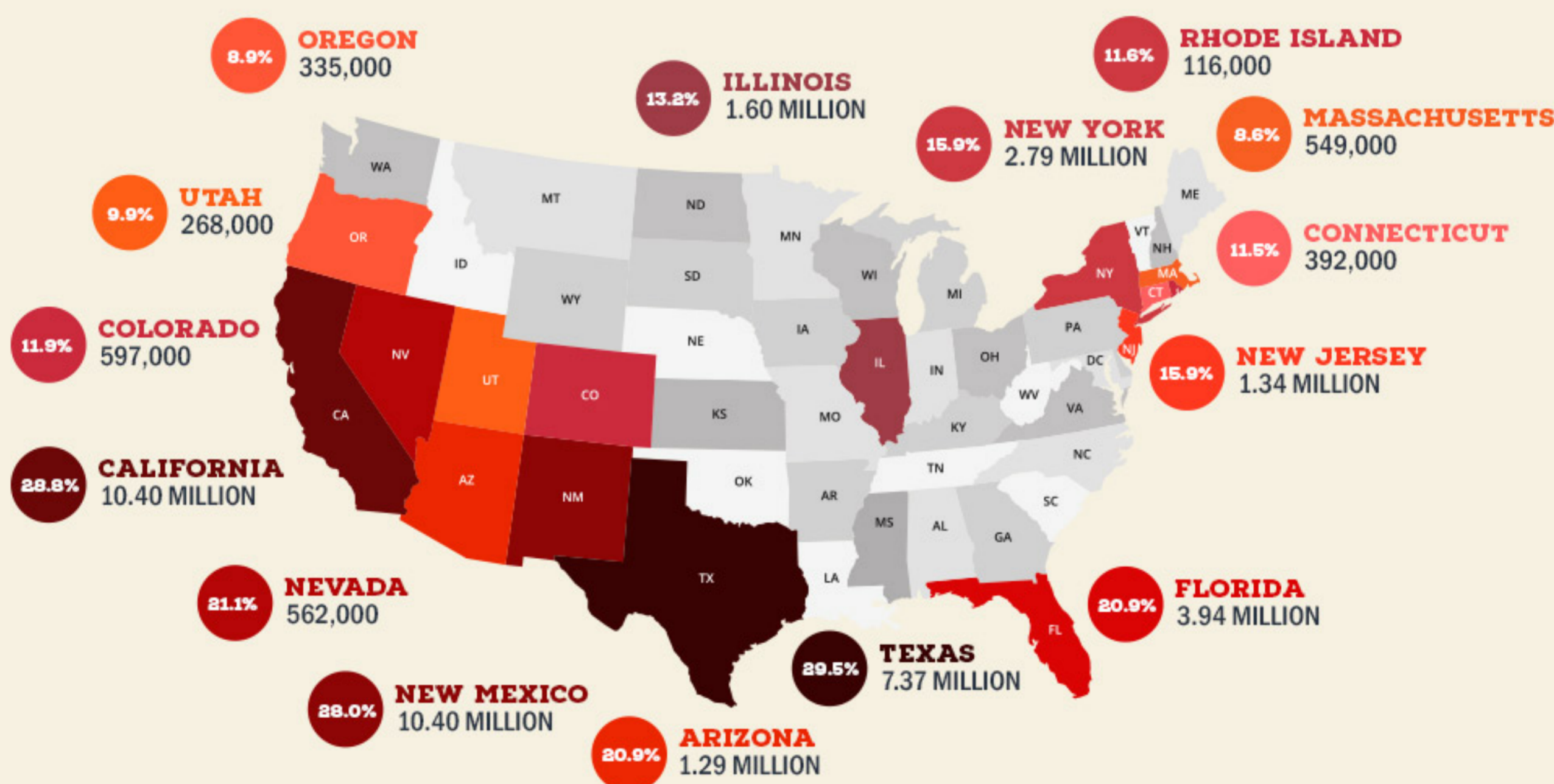
TOP 8 NON-ENGLISH U.S. LANGUAGES
